## Synopsis

Ask for Jane is a fictionalized version of the true story of the Jane Collective, a group of young women in 1969 who helped provide over 11,000 safe and illegal abortions in the years before Roe v. Wade.


"Jane" operated like a spy network, with blindfolding, multiple locations, and code names (everyone involved in the movement was called "Jane") and a tense but complicated relationship with the local police.

The movie follows Rose, a "good girl" student at the University of Chicago who breaks out of her safe, middle-class life to help a desperate friend find a safe abortion.

Rose and her more radical counterpoint Janice begin providing the doctor's number to anyone who needs it. After graduating, they decide to build an entire underground network of illegal abortion doctors willing to provide low-cost abortions for women in need.

Her conspirators include women from all walks of life and backgrounds (including wealthy women, rape victims, schoolteachers, and moms). They are also helped by Charlie, an attractive con-man abortion doctor (based on a real person), who eventually trains the young women to do abortions themselves.

The women of Jane were ultimately arrested for their crimes, but in the wake of the Roe v. Wade decision, all charges against them were eventually dismissed.

# Why This Story Matters Today


Ask for Jane is highly unique both in its representation of women on screen and behind the camera, and its powerful subject matter.

The Geena Davis Institute compiles data every year on the gender disparities of the film industry. They have found that the vast underrepresentation of female characters in film has barely changed in the last half a century.

It is groundbreaking to make a film with roughly **three** speaking female characters to every one male, not to mention a female writer, director, and producer. And there's a clear market for films with this kind of representation!

- Hidden Figures a period drama about an untold piece of women's history – grossed over 206.1 million USD. That's over an 800% profit from its initial budget of 25 million.
- Obvious Child an independent film about abortion was filmed for only 1 million and made back 3.3 million, yielding a 300% profit.
- Grandma another female-centric film about abortion was made for only 600K, and made back 7.1 million. That's a profit of over 1,000%!

In our current political climate, the discussion of feminism and women's rights is more prevalent than ever. Abortion access is under direct attack as right wing lawmakers try to control female bodies. Perhaps they don't remember – or never learned – what America looks like without safe and legal access to abortion. *Ask for Jane* shows what women had to go through before Roe v. Wade; if we don't learn from our past, how can we ever hope to make progress as a nation?

### Letter from the Creator

When I first learned about the Jane Collective and conceived of this project in May of 2016, I had no idea just how relevant it would be today. This was before the election, before the #MeToo movement, before the Kavanaugh hearings... While it is endlessly frustrating that we're now fighting in earnest for the same rights that our grandmothers fought for 50 years ago, it is also heartening that we have this beautiful film to share with a world that now so desperately needs it.

In these times of political upheaval, many of us are looking for ways to help, ways that they can make a difference. One of the many things that I love about Rachel's beautiful screenplay for *Ask for Jane* is the theme of learning how to be an activist, and discovering that you are capable of more than you ever imagined.

I'm so excited to be bringing to life this powerful pro-choice feature film, and to have you be a part of that experience. I am a Barnard alumnus, a Planned Parenthood volunteer escort, and a passionate supporter of women's rights, as well as an actor. I knew right away that the story of the Janes would make an incredible film, and that it was the perfect conflation of my work as a filmmaker and as a feminist, an artist and an activist.

Making abortion illegal doesn't mean fewer abortions happen, it just means that more women die as a result of them. *Ask for Jane* can serve as a powerful reminder of what America looks like without safe abortion access. It is ultimately an empowering story of women coming together to help each other when society won't.

#### Rachel Carey, Writer/Director

Rachel is an award-winning writer and director. Her recent project "Takers," a 1-hour tv pilot that she wrote and directed, won the award for Best Actress at Seriesfest in 2016 and played at festivals nationwide. The music video "Stiff Arm" that she directed for independent artist Lily Finessy was the winner of Best Music Video in the 2016 American Movie Awards. Her novel *Debt* was optioned to be turned into a television series by Calamity Jane, Ellen Pompeo's production company. Rachel holds an MFA in film directing from NYU and a BA in English from Yale University



#### Cait Cortelyou, Creator/Producer/Star
